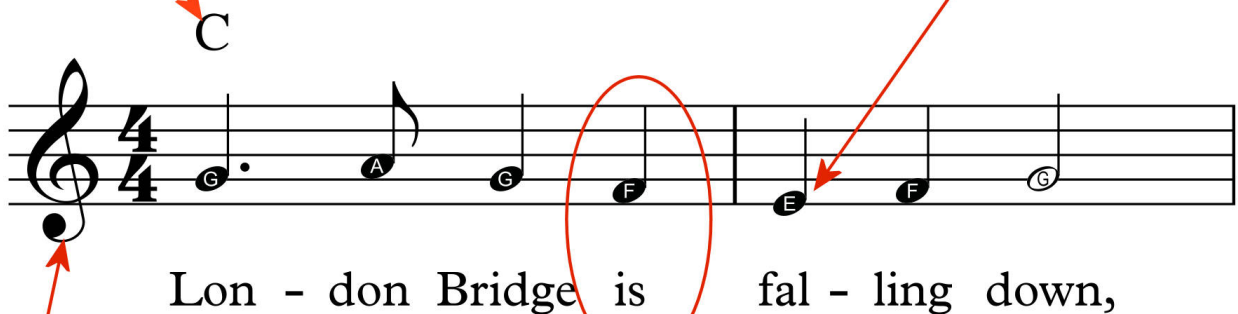

Chord symbols can be used by another musician, when accompanying on another instrument

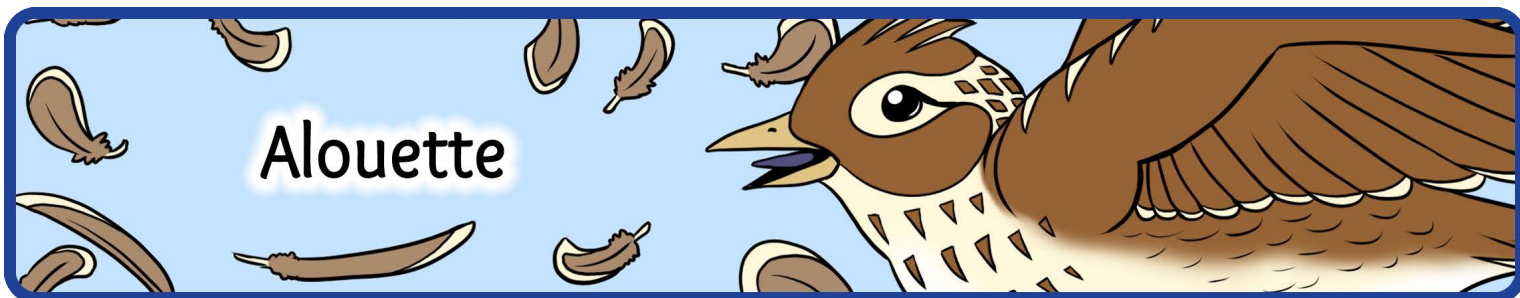
Note names have been labeled to make learning to read music much easier
